A unique debut science-fiction novel set in an Abu Dhabi where buildings defenestrate people for transgressing laws, and following the Malayali expat Anaswara who starts to investigate some mysterious deaths.

'Then it began. The building coughed. The walls squeezed like your throat muscles. Then the bed was gone. The window looked like a mouth, the rectangle loosening to form the circle. Thoo! Out we were into the night.'

In an alternate timeline in Abu Dhabi, the buildings are controlled by a Premeditated Expulsion System (PES), which defenestrates residents out of their apartments whenever they transgress the laws of the land. In the Malayali expatriate community, they are known as Thuppals, the expelled, spat out of the buildings onto the road below.

In this world, Anaswara is an architectural history researcher in New York, whose research on the PES leads her to a series of mysterious deaths when the PES system crashed, forcing her family to move out of Abu Dhabi. Together with Nourah, an old friend, she returns to Abu Dhabi to solve the mystery once and for all – and also make good on a promise to her mother, Latha.

Interspersed with PES product manuals, poems, emails and chats, and journal entries, *Thoo!* marks the debut of a gifted voice who pushes the novel to new territories. Between the anxieties of defenestration and the wounds of memory, Aathma Nirmala Dious's debut novel brings to life the dislocation that enforced migrations brings in a world not unlike our very own.

The Courtesan, Her Lover, and I


Building on her years of wide-ranging reporting on streaming, music journalist Liz Pelly details the consequences of the Spotify model by examining both sides of what the company calls its two-sided marketplace: the listeners who pay with their dollars and data, and the musicians who provide the material powering it all. The music business is notoriously opaque, but here Pelly lifts the veil on major stories like streaming services filling popular playlists with low-cost stock music and the rise of new payola-like practices.

For all of the inequities exacerbated by streaming, Pelly also finds hope in chronicling the artist-led fight for better models, pointing toward what must be done collectively to revalue music and create sustainable systems. A timely exploration of a company that has become synonymous with music, *Mood Machine* will change the way you think about and listen to music.

House of Huawei





Survivors are determined to achieve change. As Crawshaw argues, Western double standards cannot be allowed to tip the scales of justice.
